

5-Year State Plan

The SC DD Council receives federal funding for advocacy, capacity building, and systems change efforts. These efforts are designed to contribute to a coordinated system of services, supports, and assistance centered around, and driven by, individuals with developmental disabilities and their families.

Council's work is driven by a 5-year state plan covering federal fiscal years 2022-2026. The plan was developed with input from people with developmental disabilities, family members, and interested stakeholders from around the state of South Carolina.

One unexpected outcome from the Housing Education grant is that families are now looking for more transitional services that focus on independent living skills that prepare teens and adults for living in independent communities.





A key outcome of the Walking Club is participants' ability to walk at their own pace for extended periods, engaging in meaningful interactions and reaping health benefits for both mind and body. Many have reported improved endurance, weight loss, and the formation of lasting friendships through their participation in the club.

Success

A participant from IMPACT SC and Calhoun County noted CLA helped him articulate his healthcare needs with his doctors and expressed his desire to have his old wheelchair refreshed and donated to someone who didn't have the resources for a wheelchair that he desperately needed. CLA is helping him serve on the Calhoun County Disabilities Board as the only disabled board member. He also serves as part of Advocates for Quality Life.

Success

One outcome of the EQUIP program was in a collaboration with public transportation, GreenLink, in Greenville, SC. Participants learned practical skills for using public transportation, fostering social connections and community belonging. The positive response to this has increased interest in similar community events and has brought out new partnerships in other areas of the state.

Resources

The Council represents all of South Carolina and is responsible for carrying out the provisions of the Developmental Disabilities Assistance and Bill of Rights Act (DD Act) and making sure that the DD Council is a member-driven, effective, efficient, and accountable organization. Serving up to two four-year terms, the membership of the Council is 60% of people with intellectual or other developmental disabilities or family members, and the remainder as representatives from state agencies or professional organizations. The Council guides all initiatives and contracts.


